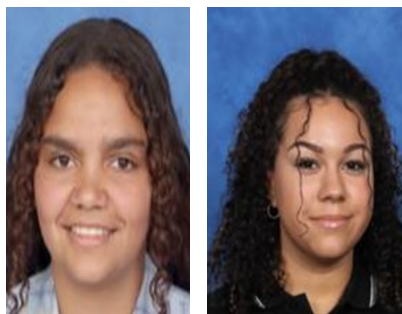
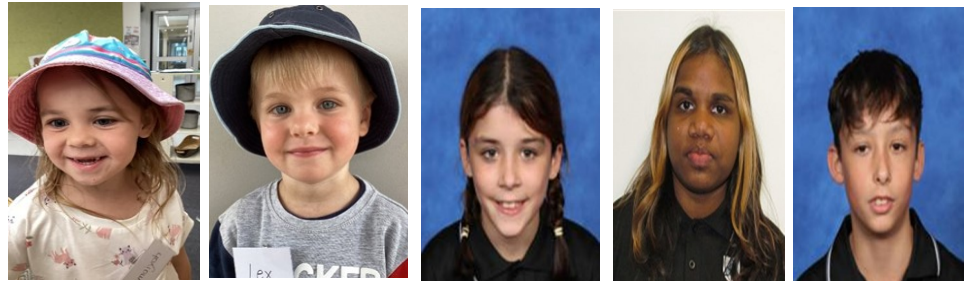

My name is Cooper Williams-Courtney and I am an Aboriginal student in Year 10. I was successful in gaining a spot in the South Australian Aboriginal Secondary Training Academy (SAASTA) in the Elite Soccer Academy in 2023.

I had a lot of fun in my first year at SAASTA because I made progress in my skills as a soccer player. The most important thing is that I have made friends in the academy. I have also been to a couple of United soccer games outside of the SAASTA program.

The biggest highlight for me this year was going up to Brisbane to play in the First Nations Indigenous Soccer Tournament. The greatest thing happened up there, and that was our Soccer team coming away as winners of the tournament. I was so proud of this achievement because it made me feel really excited and pumped. While we were in Brisbane we went to Movie world and did a few more deadly things and went to other places as well.

In 2023, I studied various subjects such as PE both theory and practical lessons. This has enabled me to keep fit and healthy. We did a lot around basic fitness such as gaining a lot of understanding and an awareness of what it takes to get to the top level as a professional soccer athlete.

During the Soccer SAASTA sessions we did a mixture of things ranging from both playing soccer scratch matches and practicing skills and drills weekly. In the classroom component of the program is where we did a lot of Aboriginal cultural learning. This included me having the opportunity to learn more about my Aboriginal culture. Through this it has given me more of an understanding of culture. This is something I would like to further learn in 2024.

I am definitely going back next year for what will hopefully be another fun year, filled with a lot of Soccer, as well as more cultural experiences and opportunities.

I am looking forward to continuing my journey with the SAASTA Elite Soccer Academy through SAASTA.

On Wednesday 8th of November we held our annual Torrens Partnership Nunga Graduation Ceremony at Wiltja Boarding Residence. In attendance there were students & families from schools & preschools in the Torrens Partnership such as Avenues College B-12, Blair Athol North B-6 School, Café Enfield Preschool, Enfield Folland Park Preschool, Northfield Preschool, Wandana Preschool—Year 6, Klemzig Primary School, Enfield Primary School, Hamsptead Primary, Hillcrest Primary and Northfield Primary School.

We saw across 26 Preschool students, 36 primary students and 4 students from who participated in the Nunga graduation for 2023.

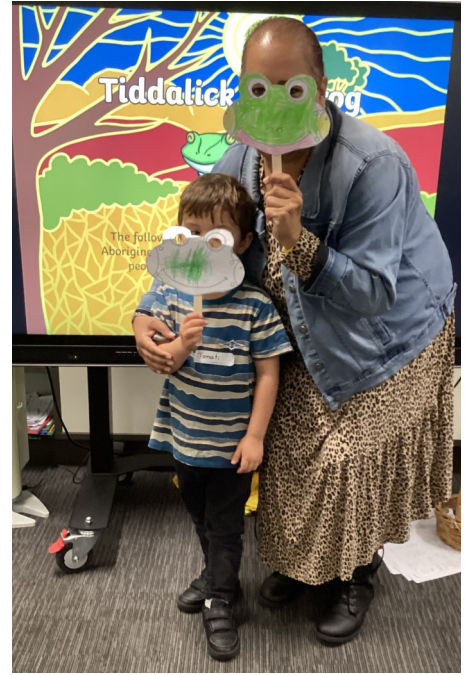
