

School Attendance Matters



18 OR MORE DAYS

- Excused and unexcused absences represent lost time in the classroom and lost opportunities to learn
- Missing just one day every two weeks can add up to 18 days in a year. Absences add up before you even know it.



10 TO 17 DAYS

- Students who are absent an average of 15 days a year miss a year's worth of school before their senior year.
- When students miss a day of school it actually puts them two days behind their classmates.



9 OR FEWER ABSENCES

- Students with good attendance generally achieve higher grades and enjoy school more.
- Children benefit and make the most of their educational opportunities if they attend school regularly and on time.

Memoir Writing

"In Year 11 English, students have been working on memoir writing. The students were instructed to write about a powerful memory from their childhood, using descriptive writing to convey their recollections.

Here is what Mariecler penned. She writes about her perception of beginning school in Australia"

Foreign Blue

This is a place of competition but only to me, it seems.

'Tick tock'... a confined room which holds more than thirty students, each a seat apart. Where 10 pages of blank unsolved questions that, right or wrong, dictate one's worth. The outcomes are the first resulting coordinates of a map that leads to your perfectly suited career. Achieving less than flawless is inexcusable. With this in mind, I continuously glance at the quaint wooden box, a clock situated on the Demon's desk. Hands clicking, running, minute by minute.

'Tick tock'... the suffocating pressure gravitates my head lower in order to conceal my treacherous thoughts, paranoia grows during times of desperation, seeking the answer. The sweet coercive thought of giving up resonates within my whole body. I am no longer sitting up, rather, I am curled up into a ball of misery. I grip this thin cylindrical device, a source of torment, with a plastic enclosure. As pretty as an *azure sky*, wishing for it to do everything for me, I feel unfamiliar.

I am a proud *Encantada*, Mariecler E. Soringa.

'Tick tock'... studying is something I dread, I despise the laser eyes always following my every move. My back is arched down, drawn to beastly words and numbers of burdensome homework, each exposing an inner ferocity I don't tend to show. My butt, or *gluteus maximus* as they say here, aches from sitting, the pain radiates to the soles of my feet, causing me to actively apply force on my thigh. My arms feel as heavy as the imaginary rocks I throw at myself for every senseless breakdown that is caused by overwhelming stress. Only getting one satisfaction through ten cracks of my fingers, the bizarre delight I get from this somehow relaxes my angst.

'Tick tock'... my head is full of thoughts as I try to solve each equation, attempting to comprehend the million worries my brain is barely able to maintain, piercing sounds of high pitch whistling, ringing throughout the restricted room... ouch. A pit, a swirling void, fester within my stomach leading to a disgusting vigorous expulsion of unknown contents out my mouth.

I come to this place uncommon to me. My primary days, an *ocean* of foreign blue shirts, pale skin, blonde hair, rainbow eyed people, are all I see. The Giants here talk down on me with alien language, but no matter the unfamiliarity I am required to triumph, the problem is that my brain chooses a sluggish form of thinking. I'm not smart, but being one of the top students of my class at the age of 8 contradicts this. Don't get the wrong idea, that was the beginning of the crumbling decay of my world.

Encantada is a Spanish word, a part of the Philippine mythology that also means *diwata* in Tagalog, they are deities in pre-colonial Philippines, enchanted beings with supernatural powers.

My existence was initially the calm *deep sapphire* sea, but later transformed into a tsunami of unnecessary waves of weak emotions, continuously so. My alleged failures were evident, but it's not like I've never been first place... right? From what I recall the futile struggle I engaged in then was humorous, my peers and I were classified within a hierarchy determined by grades, but at what cost? I remember all the late nights; my eyes were dry as tears ran down my face, I longed for the *cerulean waters* that my family and I visited every 2 years.

'Tick tock'... even then an inferiority complex was engraved within my lifestyle, I compared myself with everyone but always fell short; I was second, third, fourth or fifth, never more, never less.

I am a machine that functions through one purpose, to 'embody excellence', I am compelled to be the ideal, the epitome of perfection, whether this was being a daughter, sibling, cousin, student, friend or colleague, in aspects of mannerism and overall scholarly skills. To have leadership competence and be loved by all, to be firm but also have a high social standing, be above all. Remember to be polite, organised, silence your opinion, obey all rules, apologise even if you are not in the wrong... oppressed. This all leads to my fear of disapproval, the cause of insecurities, questioning my inadequacy, I seek the validation I receive in succeeding but also quietly desire to find a simple serendipity amongst a garden of blue periwinkles. This classroom is a palace of cooperation, everyone agrees.

'Tick tock'...a commodious dwelling which holds more than 30 students, seated together, we converse with one another for assistance. I'm stubborn, not a docile character. Only I can define my worth, without the needless delusion of wanting to be perfect. This peculiar place of demons and giants is foreign, but beyond, an envelopment of celestial blue what I see is me, slowly discovering my euphoria.

'Tick tock'... the constraints of a stifling atmosphere is tossed away, substituted with the embrace of warmth by the embraces of new formed friendship. I feel familiar.

SANITARY PRODUCTS

Avenues College is committed to supporting the attendance, wellbeing and engagement of female students through the provision of sanitary products when needed.

Sanitary products will be readily available so that students feel comfortable and in this way they are better equipped for learning. At Avenues College we believe that our school should provide a safe, educationally stimulating and success oriented environment. In order to fully participate and to gain the maximum benefit from the learning and care, all students must attend school every teaching day. Access to sanitary products is an important part of the support that may be required to best assist our students to learn and achieve.

All students who may need access to sanitary products so that access does not present a barrier to learning will be provided with them in a way that is respectful and in this way ensures easy access.

The College will regularly review methods for students to access sanitary products as required. These methods demonstrate how student voice has been captured to inform the process. There is evidence within the design and review of these distribution points, of the influence of student feedback.

We visited many specialty areas such as Woodwork, Metalwork, Music and Media Arts and interrupted some classes to say hello.


The visiting primary students were able to observe Avenues students who had previously attended Hampstead Primary and Avenues students were able to reconnect with teachers they had in primary school.
